	<p>Response: The college adheres to the official academic calendar set by the Department of Higher Education and Himachal Pradesh University (HPU), Shimla. The calendar provides standardized timelines for admissions, teaching, exams, and vacations across affiliated institutions. Our college also develops its own internal academic calendar aligned with these guidelines, incorporating institution-specific events within the mandated structure. The calendar of college is a part of prospects, detailing local activities while syncing with departmental academic calendar. Departments then create department-specific plans, outlining course coverage, assessments, and timelines to meet annual teaching day requirements. This multi-level alignment promotes consistency, accountability, and flexibility for effective program delivery.</p>	



1.2.2 Whether Learning Outcomes Defined: Yes & 100%**5**

Response: The colleges display Course Outcomes (COs) and Program Outcomes (POs) for each subject and course on their official websites. These outcomes are mostly formulated by the respective Boards of Studies of HPU and also by the concerned faculty members of the college to reflect the knowledge, skills, and problem-solving abilities students should acquire by the end of a course or program.

Additionally, faculty members inform students about the specific learning outcomes at the beginning of each lecture, as outlined in their lesson plans. This practice helps students focus on key concepts and goals for that session, enhancing engagement and learning effectiveness.

**1.2.3 Curriculum Enrichment Practices (e.g. projects, surveys, Education tours and industry visits)****16**





Response: The college implements curriculum enrichment practices such as projects, surveys, educational tours, and industry visits to bridge theoretical learning with practical application, fostering hands-on skills and real-world exposure for students.

1. **Projects:** Students undertake subject-specific projects, in the subjects such as Commerce, Geography, Tourism and Travels, and BCA, to apply concepts in research and analysis, with lists and outcomes tracked for assessment.
2. **Surveys:** Faculty members of the institution engage students in the conduct of field surveys on local issues, enhancing data collection and critical thinking skills. During 2024-25 students were engaged in data collection on a project titled “Vision Shimla 2040: Heading Towards Net Zero Emission- A Students’/Citizens Perspective”
3. **Educational Tours:** Every year Tourism Department of the college organises educational tour to provide cultural and environmental insights, correlating with curriculum objectives.
4. **Industry Visits:** Visits to factories and companies offer exposure to operations, hardware/software use, and professional interactions. This is students of commerce and Journalism and Mass Communication made industrial visit to Amar Ujala Premise at Shoghi Shimla.

**1.2.4 Internal Assessment Mechanism (quizzes, class test, presentation, assignment, MTT etc):****8**

Response: The continuous comprehensive assessment (CCA) system followed by HPU includes attendance, assignments, seminars, and examinations, which are all designed to measure students' achievement of these outcomes during the course. Thus, student learning is continuously monitored against the predefined outcomes ensuring quality education and accountability.

Response: The institution encourages students to enrol in add-on and certificate courses offered online through SWAYAM/NPTEL to enhance their knowledge and employability. During the academic year 2024–25, 22 students from the Department of Zoology completed a five-day certificate course in bee-keeping, which provided hands-on exposure to apiculture practices and allied livelihood opportunities. Similarly, the Departments of Music, English, and Hindi have designed and offered add-on/certificate courses relevant to their respective disciplines. All such courses are designed and implemented under institutional guidelines that specify minimum contact hours, clearly defined learning outcomes, and appropriate assessment mechanisms in line with established best practices for add-on/value-added courses in Indian higher education.

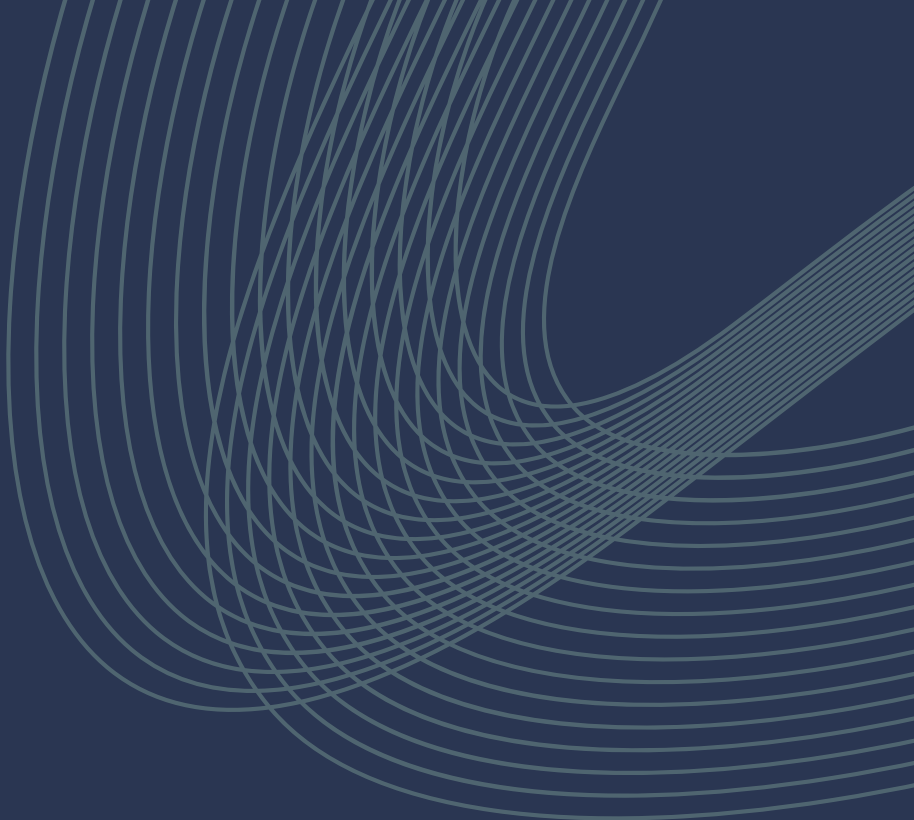
